John's greatest focus is on the Church as a family that is united in the love of Jesus. He begins 2 and 3 John by referring to himself as the "elder" and his recipients as beloved children. Life Application Starters:

What does "elder" John father in his home or a pastor in his congregation? How does a stable home where children abide in the unconditional love of Jesus teach them to be

eternal children in the family of Jesus? How can a Christian congregation provide the same teaching for God's "children" of all ages? What sin has not been paid for by Jesus' crucifixion? Do we need to fear the sin that leads to death? (SEE TLSB Pg. 2181)

Prayer Starters: To respect & pray for our "elders" in our homes and churches who faithfully represent Jesus to the beloved children of God. That we are all faithful children of God who love as He loved us. That we never deny the Spirit and refuse to repent. That we abide steadfast in Jesus' love in these end times.

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Historical Context: For 3 John John recorded his see week 101. Jude was likely revelation from the LORD written by a half brother of Jesus, not an apostle, but an associate with them, in ~68 AD. Revelation was written by John, the apostle, in either Bride of Christ, for her 68 AD (under the persecution mission in these final days of Nero) or 95 AD (near the end of his life).

Law & Gospel Themes:

Jude wrote to warn against false teachers. He cites 9 references from the OT (5-15) to warn of God's judgment against rebellion (SEE Chart on TLSB Pg. 2189). Yet, he also encourages the faithful to rescue those entrapped in lies (23). He gives hope through a glorious ignorantly deceived as doxological closing (24f).

to celebrate the exalted reign of the Victor, Christ Jesus, and to comfort and encourage the Church, the until Jesus returns in judgment (SEE TLSB Pg. 2216). Jesus IS in control. Satan and evil will NOT prevail. The Church WILL endure and spread to all nations until Jesus returns.

Life Application Starters:

What urgency is placed on us by God's consistent judgment on rebellion? How should we treat the opposed to those who are

blatantly rebellious against the truth of God's Word? How does it help to see Revelation as a book of images and figures for the comfort of Christians rather than as a timeline of world events? To what degree can Satan and evil assault us individually and as the Church?

Prayer Starters: Regularly pray Jude 24f as a source of comfort, power and hope as we await Jesus' return in judgment. For all to heed Christ's warning of judgment, repent and be ready when He returns. To courageously tell of Jesus as LORD and Savior every day to all people before He returns in judgment.

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Historical Context:

Revelation was written by John, the apostle, in either 68 judgment. 6:1-8:5 depicts AD (under the persecution of Nero) or 95 AD (near the end of his life).

Chapters 4 and 5 are the heart of Revelation focused on Jesus as the exalted and reigning LORD of the universe 12 and 13 next week. who will sustain and then save His Bride, the Church. 5:9&10 are a good "capsule" picture of this theme. Jesus is cover sin is a theme that the Lamb slain for the salvation of all who receive Him. The Church is His Kingdom in action on earth to Jesus as the Lamb slain for bear witness to all. We have power over evil through Jesus. Chapters 6-21 are a

Life Application Starters:

The shedding of blood to has been prominent through our entire Bible journey, pointing clearly to us. How does Rev. 5:9&10 apply this theme to bring comfort and purpose to us

who are in the Church, the Kingdom of God on earth? Knowing Jesus holds all the ultimate power of the universe, how does this impact your daily life in service to Him? As the Bride of Christ, what can all of us in the Church learn from the example of a faithful Christian wife as she relates to her husband and children in God's way?

Prayer Starters: In thanks that we are covered by the blood of Jesus through Baptism, Holy Absolution and the Lord's Supper. To be faithful priests who boldly share God's Word of judgment and deliverance.

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Historical Context:

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Law & Gospel Themes:

A third scene of the End Times, depicted in Rev. 12:1-14:20, is a battle between the 12x12x10x10x10) by the Triune God and three evil opponents: Ch. 12 features a dragon (Satan), 13:1-10 has a Chs. 17-19 foretell God's 1st beast (embodying political power that opposes God) and 13:11-18 has a 2nd beast (a "false prophet" who seeks to destroy the Church from within). While we don't take the number of the beast, 666, as a literal mark or try to tie it to one enemy

of God, we do use God's perfect Word of Truth to imperfection of the lies of Satan that are evident in his servants on earth. Ch. 14 highlights the delivery/ harvest of God's elect (144,000 is not literal, but represents completeness, Lamb, Jesus. Chs. 15f warn of God's wrath against evil. defeat of Babylon, the Prostitute, and the coming celebration marriage feast for the Bride, the Church.

Life Application Starters: As the Bride who has been rescued by the great dragon slayer, Jesus, how

does this comfort you in the face of Satan's attacks? What hope is ours in a political realm that is often opposed to the Christian Church? Stay in the Word of God daily so you can identify and destroy the lies of Satan and his servants. YOU are one of the 144,000 through faith in Jesus and He has a great marriage feast waiting for you on Judgement Day. Rejoice!

Prayer Starters: To stand firm amidst the dragon's flames, protected by Jesus' embrace. That God's Word, read daily, will enable us to see and destroy Satan's lies in the world and the church.

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Historical Context:

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Law & Gospel Themes:

Revelation concludes with hopeful words of comfort for we who are in the Church, the Bride of Christ. We are in the "1000 years" in which the Jesus!" (22:20). Church WILL continue as the Kingdom of God on earth until Jesus returns as judge. Those "raised" to life through knowing Jesus is guiding the Means of Grace have their names "written in the book of life" (20:15) and are reigning with the power of Jesus on earth. The fullness of this reign will come in the

"new heaven" and "new earth" on Judgment Day, will dwell with Jesus in the "new Jerusalem" (21:1f) in glorious light forever (21:22f). Anticipating this consummation of our joyous life with Jesus, we, His Bride, join the Spirit of God (22:17) in saying "Amen. [YES!] Come, Lord

Life Application Starters:

What comfort is there in history on His perfect timeline in this era of the Church, His Bride, and that more WILL continue to join us until He returns? In what sense have we

already risen from the dead? Who/what can ever remove your name from the Lamb's "book of life"? Why should we be eager for Jesus to come in judgment? What should we be doing while we patiently await His coming? How do you envision the marriage feast that awaits us?

Prayer Starters: Pray in joyous thanksgiving for all the riches you have received through this entire Bible reading journey. Pray for comfort and strength through God's Word as you continue to study and meditate on it daily until our Bridegroom comes!
